PREPARING FOR WORSHIP

Last Sunday we returned to the upper room where Jesus first instituted the Lord's Supper on the night He was betrayed. Before Jesus was handed over to be crucified, He gave His disciples no short sermon on the person and work of the "Helper" who will, at Pentecost, be revealed as the Third Person of the Holy Trinity. During this Easter Season, we continue to "Sing" (Latin: Cantate) the songs and liturgies of old, but we also sing to the Lord "a new Song" thanking Him for the gift He gives us in sending the Holy Spirit to guide the Church into all truth.

LUTHERANS ON THE HOLY SPIRIT

As Jesus proclaimed to His disciples before His departure, the Spirit's task will be to "bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you" (John 14:26) and to "glorify Me" (John 16:14). The Third Person of the Trinity has no desire to draw attention to himself; He has instead been sent for the purpose of directing our attention to God's saving work in Christ. In this regard Dr. Martin Luther explained: "That, then, is the Holy Spirit's office and work, that He through the Gospel reveal what great and glorious things God has done for us through Christ, namely, ransomed us from sin, death, and the power of the devil, received us into His grace and care, and given us Himself wholly and sufficiently' (WA 28:82).

Where Christ is preached, Lutherans rejoice to believe, teach, and confess that the Spirit is always present and active. Far from neglecting the Spirit, Lutherans praise, honor, and glorify Him as God. This occurs not only when they speak *about* Him, but especially when in humble silence they allow Him to speak *to* them, to reveal the Savior and proclaim His salvation.

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A NOTE FOR OUR VISITORS CONCERNING WORSHIP AT SAINT JOHN'S

Our Congregation follows the pattern of worship set forth by ancient Christians. Though "the Mass" has undergone many changes over the past 2,000 years (especially during the time of the Lutheran Reformation), what remains at the heart is God's desire to hear the prayers of His people and deliver His grace to them through His promised means. It is for this reason that we call our worship "The Divine Service," not us serving the Divine, but the Divine serving us with His Word and Sacraments.

In response to God's Grace, and with deference to the rich traditions we have inherited, we use both our voices and our bodies in worship of the Triune God, some of which may be unfamiliar or strange to you. For instance, some people will make the sign of the cross 🕂 in remembrance of their Baptism; the Congregation speaks or sings the bold portions of the liturgy. Finally, standing (attentive worship), sitting (attentive learning), and kneeling (sign of penitence and desire for grace) are symbolic actions in Christian worship that incorporate the body Romans 12:1. If you are unable to stand or kneel and remain seated throughout this Divine Service, know that your Spiritual worship is pleasing to God John 4:24; 1 Corinthians 2:15.

THE LORD'S SUPPER AT SAINT JOHN'S

Holy Scripture tells us that the earliest Christians gathered regularly for prayer, breaking of bread, and communion fellowship Acts 2:42. We continue this ancient tradition by gathering for prayers and "the breaking of the bread," on the Lord's Day. When we "do this in remembrance" of Jesus, we take seriously the words He said on the night He was betrayed; namely, that we are to eat and drink the bread and the wine, and in doing so eat and drink the very Body and Blood of Christ Matthew 25:26-28. So also, along with the earliest Christians, we confess that spiritual harm can befall those who commune with a congregation without understanding and agreeing with the beliefs of that gathering 1 Corinthians 11:17-29. As a congregation of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, we believe that all who commune at this altar are to be baptized in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, be instructed in the doctrine of the Small Catechism, and not be under pastoral care in a congregation of a different confession.

If you have any questions about what it means to be Lutheran, or would like to prayerfully explore entering into Communion Fellowship with St. John's, please speak with me after worship so we can set up a time to meet together.

When receiving the Blood of Christ, please grasp the bottom of the chalice and quide it to your lips.

If you desire to receive the blood of Christ from an individual cup instead of the Chalice, take an empty cup as you approach the altar and the Pastor will fill it from the pouring chalice.

Dear Savior, at Your gracious invitation I come to Your table to eat and drink Your holy body and blood. Amen.

PRAYER AFTER RECEIVING HOLY COMMUNION

Almighty and everlasting God, I thank and praise You for feeding me the life-giving body and blood of Your beloved Son, Jesus Christ. Send Your Holy Spirit that, having with my mouth received the holy Sacrament, I may by faith obtain and eternally enjoy Your divine grace, the forgiveness of sins, unity with Christ, and life eternal; through Jesus Christ, my Lord. Amen.

EPISTLE lames 1:16-21

Beloved brethren, ¹⁶ do not be deceived. ¹⁷ Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. ¹⁸ Of his own will he brought us forth by the word of truth, that we should be a kind of firstfruits of his creatures.
